

The Awards' Laureate News is a regular publication – all about our laureates and the infrastructure that selects and supports them.

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

The RSPH is a charity dedicated to improving the health of people in the United Kingdom and around the world. It has a membership of over 5,000 public health professionals from various sectors and is the longest-established public health organisation in the UK.

Dr Phillips-Savage, who shared the Anthony N Sabga Award for Science & Technology in 2021, is currently Associate Professor of Practice in Aquatic Animal Medicine at Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine.





### Hurricane Melissa

The Mustard Seed Communities home for individuals with disabilities in Montego Bay, Jamaica was completely flooded by Hurricane Melissa in October. Fortunately, all 33 disabled residents and their caregivers managed to find shelter on higher ground and were alive and safe when two of the community's leaders reached them after a 9-mile trek through flood-damaged terrain, but the damage to the property was significant.
