The film looked at the situation in Trinidad & Tobago of declining oil production and the imminent petroleum of the proposed a economy and solution in the work of three scientists who are laureates.





Prof Suresh Narine of Guyana, our 2015 Laureate in Science and Technology, will deliver our 2018 annual lecture in conjunction with the University of the West Indies, Cave Hill, in Barbados on November 15, at 6.30 pm.

The lecture is titled: "Why Science and Technology are crucial fulcrums for Caribbean development."

Prof Narine is a distinguished scientist who is Director of the Trent University (Canada) Centre for Biomaterials Research, and also Director of the Guyana Institute of Applied Science and Technology (IAST).

The IAST, which Prof Narine was a principal in rehabilitating, contributes to the Guyanese economy in areas as diverse as food production, personal care pharmaceuticals, and alternative fuels. He also oversees and directs research and production projects in the Far East.

This lecture marks a resumption of the ANSA Caribbean Awards' collaboration with the University of the West Indies, who have co-hosted several events with us in Trinidad and Tobago. The lecture will be livestreamed through out website.
