Our 2019 Laureates Announced

We are excited to announce our 2019 laureates, who were selected on December 1, by our Eminent Persons Panel, and ratified on December 4, by the ANSA McAL Foundation.

The 2019 laureates are: (top left) Danielle

Dieffenthaller. Filmmaker, in Arts & Letters (Trinidad & Tobago); Ms Kimala Bennett. Media Entrepreneur, in Entrepreneurship (Jamaica); Mr Corey Lane, Youth Activist, in Public & Civic Contributions (Barbados); and Prof Michael Taylor, Climate Scientist, Science & Technology (Jamaica).

There is a first in this group: two of its members are below the age of 40. Ms Bennett, whose age will not be revealed here, and Mr Corey Lane, at age 36, are the youngest

laureates in the 39 so far named.

While the Eminent Persons Selection panel did not make the selections to fill any criteria, we are excited that the relatively young people were able to match those who have been working longer in quality and integrity of work.

In keeping with our mandate to make our presence felt throughout the region, the ANSA

McAL Foundation, which is the patron of these awards, has decided that the 2019 ceremony will be staged in Barbados, on March 30, 2019 at a venue to be announced.

The Barbados ceremony will be the

third ceremony held outside Trinidad & Tobago, and it reflects the commitment of the Foundation to engage the regional public.

Also, in keeping with our public education mandate, to disseminate the work of our laureates for the benefit of the regional community, we have decided to produce a documentary on climate change which will draw upon the work of our newest laureate, Prof Michael Taylor.

The film will feature the work of other laureates through

the region whose work, directly and indirectly, addresses this most pressing issue of our time. Our last documentary, Sun, Sea and Science, premiered at the Trinidad & Tobago Film Festival, and has been shown on television in Trinidad.
